Update from the President

Dear Colleagues,

I again want to highlight the exceptional academic work of a couple of our Peace Research Grant recipients.

Mario R. Cépeda Cáceres, from Peru, received a Grant from the IPRA Foundation in 2022. As a result of the work he completed with our grant, he has been awarded a Gates Cambridge Scholarship to pursue a Ph.D. in Latin American Studies at the University of Cambridge. His Ph.D. project represents the second phase of his research.

Helin Unal (a Peace Research Grant recipient in 2020) has recently published three articles examining collective victimization beliefs across different contexts of oppression. These include **Towards a Conceptual Integration of Collective Victimization Beliefs and Their Variation Within and Across Contexts: A Q Methodology Study in Five Communities**, published in the European Journal of Social Psychology, **Beliefs about Collective Victimization in Contexts of Ongoing and Historical Oppression: A Q Methodology Study among Kurds from Turkey and Northern Kurdistan in Germany**, published in Political Psychology (DOI: 10.1111/pops.70105), and **Different Beliefs about Collective Victimization Predict Support for Distinct Resistance Strategies: Survey Findings among the Kurdish Diaspora**, published in the Journal of Community and Applied Social Psychology, 35(4).

We continue to be amazed at the academic work of these scholars!

Our Peace Research Grant review committee was very busy this past cycle reviewing all the grant applications we received. We received many outstanding applications and decided to fund four more grants, for a total of eleven grants this year. Please note more about those grantees below.

PJSA Conference Report - October 2025, Swarthmore, PA

[Dr. Stephen Kapinde](#), a prior Peace Research Grant recipient, recently traveled to Swarthmore, PA for the PJSA (Peace and Justice Studies Association) Conference. He had this to say about his time at the conference:

The IPRA Foundation provided me with travel funding to attend the PJSA Conference in Swarthmore, PA, USA, in October 2025, to present my IPRAF funded research. The theme of the conference was *"Leveraging Legacies and Peacemaking in Precarious Times."* The conference was well attended with approximately 420 participants from diverse sectors, including academics, students, activists, and policymakers, focusing on the study and practice of peace and justice.

The conference was graced by three keynote speakers including Kazu Haga, a peace trainer and practitioner with over 25 years of experience in nonviolence and restorative justice, Rachel Elizabeth Harding an experienced writer on Religion and social justice among communities of African descent in the US and Brazil and Atalia Omer from the Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies at the University of Notre Dame with her thought-provoking presentation on decolonizing Religion and peacebuilding.



I presented my research paper, "Global Histories of Peacebuilding: Integrated Interfaith Approaches to Counter-Violent Extremism in Kenya" aimed at

unmuting interfaith voices in counter-violent extremism in Coastal Kenya where terrorism and violent extremism incidences were on the rise between 2009 and 2015. The paper was very well received and generated much discussion considering that religion and violence is a multifaceted issue which often intersects with religious beliefs and identity.

This type of personal collaboration with other scholars and practitioners through IPRA Affiliate conferences such as PJSA is vital to my studies on peace and has enhanced my ability to integrate diverse methods in my research as a whole. I am grateful to the IPRA Foundation and also to PJSA for the opportunities to present my work.



Dr. Stephen Kapinde is a current Research fellow at the Research Institute for Theology and Religion, University of South Africa, Pretoria and associate lecturer, Religion and Global Politics, University of London. He is a former Lecturer of Religion and Public Life at Pwani University, Kenya.
